

ABOUT THE SOLOISTS

Debra Fong, Violin

Violinist Debra Fong is Concertmaster of the Peninsula Symphony, Associate Concertmaster of the San Jose Chamber Orchestra, and Principal Second Violinist of the San Francisco Chamber Orchestra. She spends her summers as a first violinist with the Grammy Award-winning Santa Fe Opera Orchestra.





she maintains a private violin studio. She is a faculty coach for Young Chamber Musicians, a guest conductor for the Palo Alto Chamber Orchestra, and a judge for several annual young artist concerto competitions. Debra is a former violin faculty member at The College of William & Mary, The Music Institute of Chicago, and New England Conservatory of Music Preparatory School.

Debra received her Bachelor and Master of Music degrees in Violin Performance with Honors and Distinction from the New England Conservatory of Music in Boston, where she studied with Eric Rosenblith, James Buswell, Eugene Lehner, and Louis Krasner.

Debra has been a featured chamber musician at Toronto Summer Music; Bay Chamber Concerts in Maine; Grand Teton Music Festival; Santa Fe Chamber Music Festival; Yellow Barn Chamber Music Festival in Vermont; Sarasota Music Festival; and Yale/Norfolk Chamber Music Festival in Connecticut. She has been a guest artist with the St. Lawrence String Quartet, Chicago Chamber Musicians, North American New Music Festival in Buffalo, NY, and the New Music Festival at Santa Clara University. Debra is an avid proponent of contemporary music and has worked closely with composers such as Olivier Messiaen, Thomas Adès, Joan Tower, Bright Sheng, and Kaija Saariaho.

Debra's discography includes recordings with The Santa Fe Opera, indie pop vocalist Vienna Teng, Stanford Chamber Chorale, composer John Luther Adams, Mannheim Steamroller, and she has performed on numerous film soundtracks.

Debra plays a Giuseppe Rocca violin kindly on loan from Stanford University's Harry R. Lange Instrument Collection.



Christopher Costanza, Cello

For nearly four decades, cellist Christopher Costanza has enjoyed a varied and exciting career as a soloist, chamber musician, and teacher. A winner of the Young Concert Artists International Auditions and a recipient of a prestigious Solo Recitalists Grant from the National Endowment for the Arts, Mr. Costanza has performed to wide critical acclaim throughout the U.S., Canada, South America, Australia, New Zealand, Asia, and Europe. "Mr. Costanza demonstrated an unaffected, graceful approach to phrasing, a rugged, fearless technique, and, when necessary, and energetic headlong

approach," proclaimed the New York *Times*. And, from the Cleveland *Plain Dealer*, praise for a recent performance of Bach's Unaccompanied Suites: "Costanza revealed himself to be a thoughtful interpreter as well as a technician of no small skill. Tempos were brisk but never rushed, and dynamics were carefully measured. In the Courante, Costanza demonstrated a nice continuity of bowing, while the Sarabande became in his hands an introspective but eloquent song. He used the lightest of touches in the subsequent Minuets and brought an infectious rhythmic impulse to the concluding Gigue."

Mr. Costanza, a graduate of the New England Conservatory of Music in Boston, actively toured as the cellist of the St. Lawrence String Quartet (SLSQ) from 2003-2023. His current musical activities include solo performances and varied chamber music collaborations, including cycles of the complete Bach Unaccompanied Cello Suites at the Phillips Collection in Washington, DC, at Stanford University, and other locations; the complete Britten Cello Suites presented as a cycle; a collaboration with the Stanford Chamber Chorale on tour in Hawaii; solo and chamber music performances at multiple California Bay Area venues; and a concerto tour of France with the Stanford Symphony Orchestra. Additionally, Mr. Costanza enjoys giving pre-concert lectures, presenting informal concert/lectures, and writing about music

Mr. Costanza is a full-time Artist in Residence at Stanford University, where he teaches cello and chamber music, serves as the Associate Director of Music for the Stanford Medical Humanities and Arts program, and performs concerts and gives lectures across campus. His recordings are readily available on Apple Music and Spotify, including several with the SLSQ. Mr. Costanza's recording of the Six Suites for Solo Cello by J.S. Bach can be streamed on his website, costanzacello.com.

In addition to his varied musical interests, Mr. Costanza is an avid runner and hiker. A train enthusiast, he enjoys riding and exploring passenger railways while on tour. At home in California, he is passionate about cooking, creating dishes that take advantage of the abundance of organic local produce.

ABOUT THE ENSEMBLES

Stanford Medicine Orchestra & Chorus

There has long been a vibrant relationship between medicine and music. Music has been called "medicine for the brain," and provides a direct human connection among performers and listeners. Many caregivers and patients use and play music for its soothing and restorative power.



The Stanford Medicine Orchestra and Chorus, founded in Spring 2022 and supported by Stanford's Medicine & the Muse program, now perform concerts throughout the year, showcasing a diverse repertoire of classical and contemporary works. The orchestra and chorus consists of volunteer musicians, including Stanford School of Medicine (SOM) and Stanford Healthcare faculty, staff, residents, postdocs, and students. Led by Maestros Terrance Yan and Minseung Choi, the ensembles welcome all Stanford community members affiliated with the Stanford SOM and Stanford Medicine.

ABOUT THE CONDUCTORS

Minseung Choi, Conductor Stanford Medicine Chorus

Minseung Choi has been a performer and a student of music across borders for over two decades. He studied conducting with Gabriel Crouch and Michael Pratt at Princeton University, and with Stephen Sano at Stanford University. He served as the assistant conductor for Princeton University Glee Club and has directed student and community choirs at Princeton and Stanford. He directed several productions for the Princeton Opera Company, such as Jacques Offenbach's *Orpheus in the Underworld* and Giacomo Carissimi's *Jephthe* and *Jonas*, and co-directed Contrapunctus XIV, a student earlymusic vocal ensemble. Most recently, he conducted for



Stanford Chamber Chorale as a guest conductor. He is also trained in piano, violin, and voice, and has performed in many ensembles, including Princeton University Glee Club, Stanford Chamber Chorale, and Stanford Light Opera Company.

Minseung's interests in music extend to his broader curiosity about sensory perception. He has explored this interest through science research: first studying fruit fly song production at Princeton University during his BS in Computer Science, and then studying fly vision at Stanford University where he is currently pursuing a PhD in Neurosciences.



Terrance Yan, Conductor Stanford Medicine Orchestra

Terrance Yan is the music director and conductor of the Stanford Medicine Orchestra and the Infinite Philharmonic, an orchestra he found with his colleagues at Apple. With two decades of experience in the Bay Area, he is dedicated to fostering a welcoming, inclusive, and diverse environment for music-making within the community.

Terrance earned his MMus and BMus from San Francisco State University. He has served as a conducting fellow at multiple music festivals and has received valuable coaching from renowned conductors, including

Kenneth Kiesler, Donald Portnoy and Markand Thakar. Terrance also holds an MBA from University of Illinois Urbana-Champaign and an MS in Information Systems from Boston University.
